The event was won by Martin Pyne in 51-45. The only other local rider was Andrew Horner who was also disappointed. He has an objective of getting under 50 minutes but finished with 53-26.

I was rather off put by a rider who was warming up and started behind me, overtook me on the first climb and then sat up about 200-300 yards in front of me. I know I am not very fast but this rather rubbed it in. I do not know who won as I went home for some dinner.

HERTFORDSHIRE WHEELERS 30 - E72/30 - 15th June

A new vets club record was the surprising result for this event which had a very inauspicious start. The forecast was for cold sunshine but as we drove down the rain varied between drizzle and heavy. I rather assumed the event would be cancelled as the A12 is not the place to be in heavy rain. There were a lot of DNS's at the beginning as other people thought the same. I was completely uninterested as I warmed up (or cooled down might be more accurate) on this fairly still but cold morning.

The course was the normal E72/25 with an extra leg down a 'B' road at the turn. On the way out there were rattling noises coming from the handlebars which put me off until I realised that it was the expander bolt in the tribars that was rattling loose. I hoped I would not lose the bolt as I am sure it would be difficult to replace. It got more and more rattling as the event progressed and was very bad at the turn which I negotiated on the drops so the tribars were sounding very noisy. They held together and I did not lose the bolt. I had reached the turn in a reasonable time so I started to really try on the way back, helped by a slight north wind. I finished with 1-13-24 to beat the old vet's record of 1-15-47 very substantially.

Andrew Horner punctured and with no spare had a very long cold wait for his mother to go and pick him up. He was still shivering 3/4 hour later.

The only other local rider was Pete Baumber who finished in 1-18-57. The event was won by Les Palmer in 1-1-58.
